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

Safety Hazards in the Learning Environment

Creating a safe environment for young children is an important part of quality care. Since young children lack the ability to assess danger and easily forget when told something could hurt them, it is up to the adults to minimize environmental hazards. The Environment Rating Scales (ECERS-R, ITERS-R and FCCERS-R) and Caring for Our Children are valuable resources for programs both in identifying hazards and creating and planning for a safe environment.

Infant/Toddler Specialists observe all areas accessible to the children for safety hazards. Hazards are evaluated as either "major" or "minor". Major hazards are serious hazards which require medical attention. Minor hazards are those that do not require medical attention or cause serious injury. While likelihood of an injury and supervision are also factors it is important to remember accidents will happen and spaces are evaluated on the "potential" for injury.

One way to minimize safety hazards in the learning environment is to develop a safety checklist and do routine inspections of all areas accessible to the children. Hazards listed in the Learning Environment Reports may not be a complete list of all items that can be considered unsafe; therefore, it is important for staff to evaluate the safety of all materials, equipment, and any other items in the children's environment. The **STOP** Environment Rating Scales provide a list of common hazards to consider, both indoors and outdoors. Many times simple adjustments like locking materials away or removing broken equipment can drastically reduce the potential for injury. After safety hazards have been identified, develop a plan to eliminate or minimize the hazards. Read labels; look for what age group products and toys were intended and lock away anything that has a warning to, "Keep Out of Reach of Children". Class Descriptions

The Creative Curriculum[®] for Infants, Toddlers and Twos: Exploring Sand and Water

Teachers plan meaningful experiences by selecting materials that match children's growing abilities and interests, by observing what children do, and by reflecting on those observations. Knowing how to engage children in a variety of experiences enables teachers to provide them with a rich array of potential learning opportunities.

Chicka Chicka Boom Boom: A-Z Around the Room

Learn how to apply a cross-curricular approach using the book Chicka Chicka Boom Boom. Participants will come away with activities and ideas in the areas of early literacy, math, science, music & movement, and art.

The Creative Curriculum® for Preschool: Block Play

Blocks appeal to young children because they feel good to the touch, are symmetrical, and invite open-ended explorations. When children construct, create, and represent their experiences with blocks, they grow in all areas of development.

The Creative Curriculum® for Preschool: Dramatic Play

Dramatic play is central to children's learning and development. In this training, participants will explore ways of creating a dramatic play area for children to learn and explore as they engage in dramatic play.

The Creative Curriculum[®] for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos: Planning a Responsive Environment

A well-planned room for infants, toddlers or twos is a welcoming place for children and families, and a pleasant, efficient place in which to work. As children develop, teachers also use their knowledge of individual children to create schedules, plan for transitions, and complete weekly plans. Participants will also explore the ways in which they create a daily structure.

Parent Engagement in Strengthening Families

This course will provide an introduction to the Strengthening Families approach which centers on shifting the focus from risks and deficits to strengths and resiliency. The course will also look at the importance family involvement plays in strengthening families by exploring strategies to help child care programs increase family and male involvement.

Child Abuse, Neglect, and Abusive Head Trauma

Become familiar with the different types of child abuse and neglect and what it means to be a mandated reporter. Participants will get tips on how to prevent child abuse and neglect including shaken baby syndrome.

Safe Slumber: Creating a Safe Sleep Environment

The Safe Slumber presentation defines Sudden Ifant Death Syndrome (SIDS) and Sudden Unexpected Infath Death (SUID), identifies how to create a safe sleep environment, become familiar with SIDS/SUID and what steps educators, parents and child care providers can take to reduce SIDS and SUID. Participants will discuss definitions and statistics of SIDS/SUID and address bereavement issues related to infant mortality.

Basic Child Development

Upon completion of this professional development event participants will appreciate the principles and influences of child growth and development and recognize that child development is individual. This session addresses the four domains of child development and identifies benchmarks for each area of development for birth through six years of age.

Literacy Through the Day: Print in the Environment.

Participants will explore strategies for incorporating printed material beyond the book area. Focus will be on increasing environmental print in centers and integrating it throughout the room.

Working with Temperaments

Just as children come in all shapes and sizes, so does their temperaments. With whom do you work best? What kinds of temperaments are there? All these questions and more will be answered in this session.

The Creative Curriculum[®] for Infants, Toddlers, & Twos: Communicating with Families

To serve child well, providers must develop partnerships with families. In a true partnership created to benefit the child, families and caregivers participate equally in the relationship and communicate regularly. This training explores practical ideas for working with families to develop partnerships based on trust and mutual respect.

The Creative Curriculum[®] for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos: Going Outdoors

Teachers plan meaningful experiences by selecting materials that match children's growing abilities and interests, by observing what children do, and by reflecting on those observations. Knowing how to engage children in a variety of experiences enables teachers to provide them with a rich array of potential learning opportunities. Participants consider ways to create an environment for this type of experience and explore ideas for sharing their knowledge about the experiences with families.

Building Social Emotional Foundations

Rock Solid Foundations is a blended curriculum of the Infant/ Toddler/Preschool modules from the Center on the Social and Emotional Foundations for Early Learning (CSEFEL) curriculum; based upon the Pyramid Project model; and using the foundational framework and strategies from CSEFEL.

The Creative Curriculum® for Preschool: Toys and Games

In this event, participants will take a close look at toys and games and how they enchance every area of development in children. Participants will learn types of toys and games that are appropriate for preschoolers and ways to support learning.

The Creative Curriculum[®] for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos: Understanding that Each Child is Unique

Being aware of children's individual life's circumstances, temperaments, and language help you understand that events that may affect children's development and learning. All children need t feel included and successful. This session offers many strategies for supporting children.
