

Sand and Water Indoors and Out

Sand and water play is an excellent way for children ages 18 months and older to explore their developing senses and to facilitate fine motor and cognitive development. Provisions include: sand and water, containers to hold the sand and/or water, and materials used to pour, scoop, dig, fill and empty.

There are a variety of containers that can be used for both sand and water from manufactured tables and sprinklers to homemade sand pits or small plastic bins. When choosing an appropriate container, consider not only the safety and sturdiness but also the amount of children that will be using it at one time and the amount of play materials it will hold. Children will need enough space and materials to maximize these learning opportunities.

Appropriate sand/water toys consist of sturdy materials that provide different opportunities for children to explore. The toys should be different in size, shape, color, and level of challenge. Typical toys would be scoops, shovels, pails, rakes, molds, measuring cups and spoons, and water wheels. Additional materials to consider

are funnels, objects that

sink and float, basters, spray bottles, plastic animals, people, trucks, pots, pans, baby dolls, colanders, small soap pumps, watering cans, shells, eye drops, etc.

There are different types of substitutes that can be used in place of sand such as birdseed and sterilized potting soil.

Be cautious of what is used, as some substitutes may not be appropriate for younger children such as small pebbles, fine powders that can be inhaled like flour and corn meal, beans and Styrofoam. Food such as jello and wet noodles are not considered appropriate substitutes because they do not allow proper digging and pouring.

Preschool children should have access to sand and water play, both indoors and out every day and both sand and water should have their own provisions. Younger children should have daily access to one or the other, either indoors or out.

Class Descriptions

Basic Child Development

Upon completion of this professional development event participants will appreciate the principles and influences of child growth and development and recognize that child development is individual. This session addresses the four domains of child development and identifies benchmarks for each area of development for birth through six years of age.

Child Abuse, Neglect and Abusive Head Trauma

Become familiar with the different types of child abuse and neglect and what it means to be a mandated reporter. Participants will get tips on how to prevent child abuse and neglect including shaken baby syndrome.

Greetings and Departures

This session will stress the role of arrival and departure times in building relationships between the caregiver and parent; and between the caregiver and child.

I am Moving, I am Learning

Early Childhood programs play an important role in preventing childhood obesity, supporting motor development and promoting good nutrition. The "I am Moving, I am Learning" approach provides strategies to improve the quality of physical activity and nutrition choices for young children and their families.

I am Moving, I am Learning: Opportunity Knocks

This presentation will offer an overview of the I am Moving, I am Learning approach and focus on how to support developmentally appropriate motor development while increasing moderate to vigorous physical activity in early childhood settings.

Learning and Growing: Gardening with Children

Find out about the excitement and benefits young minds get through gardening. Learn how to incorporate gardening into your program and get suggestions for fun classroom projects.

Safe Slumber: Creating a Safe Sleep Environment

The Safe Slumber presentation defines Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) and Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID), identifies how to create a safe sleep environment, become familiar with SIDS/SUID and what steps educators, parents and child care providers can take to reduce SIDS and SUID. Participants will discuss definitions and statistics of SIDS/SUID and address bereavement issues related to infant mortality.

Social and Emotional Needs of Children in Strengthening Families

Just like adults, children have emotional and social needs. Join us to learn how to help children develop healthy social skills and help their emotional needs.

The Creative Curriculum® for Infants, Toddlers and Twos: Building Family Partnerships

To serve children well, providers must develop partnerships with families. In a true partnership created to benefit the child, families and caregivers participate equally in the relationship and communicate regularly. By being familiar with the unique characteristics, strengths, and priorities of each family, providers can find ways to build the trust and respect that are necessary to this partnership.

The Creative Curriculum® for Infants, Toddlers and Twos: Creating with Art

Learn about developmentally appropriate and process oriented art that is fun, safe and challenging for young children.

The Creative Curriculum® for Preschool: Dramatic Play

Dramatic play is central to children's learning and development. In this training, participants will explore ways of creating a dramatic play area for children to learn and explore as they engage in dramatic play.

The Creative Curriculum® for Infants, Toddlers and Twos: Enjoying Stories and Books

Teachers offer important experiences by reading books and sharing their love of stories and language. This process helps children develop a foundation for literacy. Participants will learn how to choose appropriate books for infants, toddlers and two year olds.

The Creative Curriculum® for Preschool: Sand and Water

Sand and water play touches all domains of learning. Learn new strategies to support children's development and learning through a variety experiences in sand and water play.

Working with Temperaments

Just as children come in all shapes and sizes, so does their temperaments. With whom do you work best? What kinds of temperaments are there? All these questions and more will be answered in this session.

Strengthening Families™ is a project designed for programs who work with infants and toddlers and who want to help create stronger families. Strengthening Families™ participants receive support and resource materials from our staff, directly in their homes or classrooms that focus of five protective factors, participate in a peer learning community with other teachers and providers and receive free professional development. Upon completion of all project requirements, participants receive a monetary stipend and reimbursement for attending professional development.

FAMILY FOCUS

Keeping Children Safe This Spring

With warmer weather approaching, little critters will begin coming out. Before grabbing just any pesticide, take a minute and consider all your options. Consider these tips when using pesticides:

- Choose pesticides of low toxicity first, such as boric acid (be sure products are EPA registered)
- Read and follow the label instructions on the pesticides
- Use of bait traps is preferable over spraying; ensure baits/traps are not accessible by children
- Do not use flea bombs or other "bug bombs" or "foggers"
- Ensure that pesticides are not applied when children are present; follow label instructions for the allotted time between application and children's exposure
- Do not apply pesticides where children sleep and play (as pesticide residues can linger for along time)
- Store pesticides out of children's reach; place child-resistant latches on lids and cabinet doors

 Make certain that the individual applying the pesticides is a licensed professional; choose a pest management professional (PMP) that practices effective and environmentally sensitive ways to control pest and weeds
